Introduction

This consultation focuses on the redevelopement of the former Strood Civic Centre Site.

Medway Council is delivering ambitious plans to regenerate it's urban areas and with substantial land holding, the Council can positively contribute to this objective. A key part of this is delivering new homes which reinforce economic growth and help revitalise areas. Medway Council therefore, created Medway Developement Company Ltd. to deliver high quality residential developments and are seeking to regenerate the Strood Civic Centre Site as part of the next stages in the exciting plans for improving Strood.

This consultation is about seeking your views on our proposals for the site before a planning application is submitted.

Location

The site is located in a prominent corner in Strood.

The proximity of the Strood Civic Centre site to the High Street makes it the perfect location for residents to participate in the community and for the wider community to enjoy Medway Riverside.

Existing situation

Flooding infrastructure works have been carried out to provide a platform for the development and reduce the flooding risk.

The site is currently occupied by an ambulance rest station that is to be to be re-provided on site.

























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Historical Context



Historic Development of the Site

The history of Strood is to be embraced and celebrated as the town looks ahead, to further its character and identity within Medway. Strood's history is intertwined with Rochester, being connected by the bridge. Strood was the productive and industrial engine, which supported Rochester as a religious and civic centre. Strood's town centre has been shaped by industrial infrastructure, with rail bridges and viaducts marking the entrance to the town, creating its own walled town to mirror Rochester across the river. The town's location on the River Medway has also been a thread to the identity of Strood. The historic nature and more of the river, the railway viaduct, Rochester Bridge and its industrial heritage could further enhance Strood's identity in Medway.


Proposed building character diagram

Responding to Historic Character of the Site

From our historical analysis we have drawn on the significance of the site's past built forms to define by location on the site:

- > Urban Grain
- > Building Massing
- > Roof Character and Zoning
- > Elevation Details
- > Type & Colour of Materials

The adjacent diagram maps out the historic buildings through time and overlays our footprint of the proposed scheme.









Responding to Rochester Castle

Although positioned on opposite sides of the River Medway, it is important the proposal relates back to the form and character of Rochester Castle.

From the site's viewpoint, Rochester Castle sits as a focal point within the panoramic views. At a higher level the castle overlooks our site, creating strong visual links between the two and therefore emphasising the importance of creating a sympathetic translation of the landmark.











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The Masterplan






Masterplan Principles

The scheme aims to celebrate the views across the river to the castle and cathedral from the streets and the homes of the proposal. There are clear connections to both the High Street and the river, surrounded by new public realm for the new community and wider community to enjoy.

The new urban proposal is to suit the town centre location, however, with a sensitive approach to heights to respect heritage views. The landmark edge of the design can be recognised from the bridge approach with a clear view of the new vibrant cafe/bar at ground floor.

Across the scheme there is a mixture of houses and apartments, of varying dwelling sizes for an intergenerational community.





























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Landscape and Sustainability



Landscape Concept

The landscape proposals are designed to deliver the following public realm objectives:

- > A response to the river setting: Maximising opportunities for people to experience the river setting, and enjoy the views of its surrounding landmarks.
- > Recreation space: Places for people to exercise, walk and sit in a safe, accessible, green environment.
- > Play space: Equipped and informal play space, designed for both residents and local people.
- > Urban greening: Deliver an environment which supports new planting, offering a greener healthier place to live and visit.

Streets

New streets link into off-site routes and the riverside. They are aligned to offer views of the river and support pedestrian and cycle movement. New trees line each street and mark key junctions. Material changes will help mark pedestrian priority spaces and crossing points

Riverside Park

The public realm will provide a seamless pedestrian friendly route from Strood High Street into a new Riverside Park. The park sits on the banks of both the River Medway and Jane's Creek. New open space is provided on the Upper Terrace and Creekside, whilst the lower terrace landscape is retained, with potential for enhancements to planting and seating to complement the existing path network.

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Residential Accommodation



Quality Residential Housing

The scheme comprises of both urban houses and apartments for the town centre location. Each home achieves high quality residential housing through the naturally well lit homes that aim to enhance dual aspect with outlooks of primary views such as Rochester Castle. The range of spatial arrangements and home sizes across the scheme are designed for a variety of inhabitants from larger family homes to first time buyers and downsizers.















Visual of the River Frontage



Design Principles

This landmark frontage on the River Medway has been inspired by the Aveling and Porter building that once stood on the river front. The proposed buildings are designed to make a contemporary interpretation to maintain the historic reference to the roof form, window proportions and brick detailing paying, homage to the Aveling and Porter building.

The Cafe/Bar at the ground floor will be a destination space with excellent views of the castle and cathedral and visible from the high street and bridge.

Design Principles

The southern river frontage is inspired by the form, detailing and materiality of Rochester Castle. Bespoke housing typologies have been designed to maximise public realm and views over the castle and river. Terraces from first and second floor will benefit from spectacular views whilst inset to be protected from the elements.

The crenelated built form reflects the castle form as well as window irregularity and brick detailing.


